Worship

Notable landmarks include St Mary's Church, (front cover) which is the largest parish church in Hertfordshire, the tower dates back to 1190. There are links to the 8th century king of Mercia King Offa and there is a suggestion that he founded a church on the same site.

As a trans woman of faith, I am a regular church goer and I have never had any issues with attending services at either St.Mary's in the centre of town, or Christchurch (methodist) brand street - you will receive a warm welcome at both.



Windmill hill (above), if you are feeling a bit more energetic, you can go and see the North Herts PRIDE, rainbow bench that proudly sits at the top. Installed in 2023. (It offers a great view), the hill is used for North Herts PRIDE picnics.

Places to Visit

British Schools Museum: Learn about the town's educational history at the British Schools Museum. It's a fascinating place that showcases the evolution of education in Hitchin.

North Herts Museum: (Below left) Discover more about the town's past at the North Herts museum. It's a great spot to delve into local history and culture. There's a coffee shop as well.

The museum is a member of the safe space alliance.





Hitchin Priory in Hitchin in Hertfordshire is today a hotel built in about 1700 on the site of a Carmelite friary founded in 1317, which was closed in the Dissolution of the Monasteries during the reign of Henry VIII. Parts of the original priory are incorporated in the existing building, which has been a Grade I listed building on the Register of Historic England since 1951.

Directions

By Car

Hitchin is approximately 3 miles from Junction 8 of the A1(M) motorway. If you're coming from the A1(M), take Junction 8 and follow the A602 signposted to HitchinFrom the M1 Motorway Junction 10, Hitchin is around 10 miles away. When leaving the Motorway at Junction 10, follow signs for the A505, which is also signposted to Hitchin

By Train

Hitchin is served by Great Northern/Thameslink trains from Cambridge, London (King's Cross), Peterborough, and stations on the Brighton Line. The fastest train from Hitchin to King's Cross currently takes approximately 23 minutes2

By Bus and Coach

The local Hitchin bus route network is operated by several bus companies, including Arriva, Stagecoach, and CentreBus. For details of local bus routes, timetables, and your nearest stop, you can visit Intalink or Arriva National Express route 737 (infrequent service) also stops at Hitchin Town Centre en route between Oxford and Stansted Airport.
